# **INTRODUCTION**

The Music subject area at the University of Manchester invites applications for a 36-month temporary lectureship in Music arising from the award of a three-year Leverhulme Major Research Fellowhip to Dr. Susan Rutherford. Applicants from all areas of Musicology or Ethnomusicology will be considered, but preference may be given to those offering specialism in vocal studies or performance studies. The successful candidate will be expected to lead undergraduate and Master's-level teaching in his/her field of specialism, to contribute to the management and administration of the subject area under the guidance of the Head of Music/Head of Division. While the post is primarily teaching-focused, it is expected that the candidate will contribute to the research culture of the subject area; a notional 10% of his/her working hours will be allowed to pursue these activities, and appropriate support will be available from the Division and School.

Music at the University of Manchester is one of the leading departments in the UK, its research strength acknowledged in the 2014 Research Excellence Framework, and rated the top Music department in the Complete University Guide and Sunday Times league tables for 2014. With a



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thriving undergraduate and postgraduate community numbering over 250 students, we enjoy consistently high satisfaction ratings in student surveys, including a 96% overall satisfaction rating in the 2015 NSS; the department has consistently ranked in the top three for Music in the principal league tables over the past years. Many of our students go on to develop outstanding international careers in the music profession and beyond. There are fifteen established academic posts in the department, plus the Danel String Quartet, whose members provide a series of lunchtime and evening concerts and afternoon seminars.

With the liveliest performance culture of any Music department in the country, and an exceptional student-run Music Society, we support well over 100 concerts and events each year. Our broad and challenging degree programmes encourage students to pursue the highest standards of academic, artistic and professional achievement in a stimulating musical environment with a friendly and supportive atmosphere. Over the last decade our established strengths in musicology, score-based composition and performance have expanded to include ethnomusicology, electroacoustic composition, interactive performance and sound art, arts management, and outreach projects with the wider community and our cultural partners in Manchester. The world-leading research of our staff forms the bedrock of all our teaching, from the latest research in Renaissance source studies to the use of computer-game technology; the large size and diversity of the department allows us to offer a wide range of course units without compromising on specialist expertise.

Music is housed with Drama in the Martin Harris Centre, giving us state-of-the-art equipment and facilities, including the Cosmo Rodewald Concert Hall, the John Thaw Studio Theatre and the award-winning electroacoustic composition studios at the NOVARS Research Centre. There are outstanding library facilities provided by the University of Manchester Library, which is the largest university library in Britain outside Oxford and Cambridge, with more than 4 million printed books and manuscripts, over 41,000 electronic journals and 500,000 electronic books as well as several hundred databases. As well as the Lenagan Library, housed within the Martin Harris Centre, staff and students have access to the John Rylands Library on Deansgate, which houses the university's special collections of rare books and music, and to the renowned Henry Watson Library at Manchester's Central Library.
