BACKGROUND

The Department of Classics, Ancient History, Archaeology, and Egyptology

The cultures of the classical world have been taught in the University of Manchester from its inception. Its current organisational structure, as CAHAE, dates from the merger of Archaeology with Classics and Ancient History in 2018, followed by the transfer of Egyptology into the new unit in 2019. The Department prides itself in its range and the fruitful interaction across these elements, manifestation of which occurs in the work of Dr Mazza on Graeco-Roman Egypt and her important impact work on the legal and illegal trades in ancient manuscripts from Egypt. The University of Manchester's cultural institutions, including the University Museum and the John Rylands library, with its important collection of papyri, make this an ideal location for such study.



The School of Arts, Languages and Cultures

The School of Arts, Languages and Cultures is comprised of seventeen different discipline areas arranged in nine Departments, plus the University Language Centre. It provides teaching to over 5,000 undergraduates and postgraduates, and employs around 300 academic staff, around 30 postdoctoral research fellows, and a large cohort of graduate teaching assistants, all supported by approximately 120 professional support staff. The core of the School's interests is the field of human cultures, beliefs, institutions and languages. The work of colleagues in the School is informed by a variety of theoretical perspectives and intellectual disciplines. The Head of School is Professor Thomas Schmidt.
